## Books come alive for writers fest

Adults and children get to experience books in fun ways, including retellings and walking tours

ooks will come to life this November, thanks to a slew of programmes led by homegrown authors at the Singapore Writers Festival.

Listen to a macabre retelling of the legend of Bukit Merah, retrace the footsteps of famous authors with a literary walk or hear what public sculptures would say if they have voices with a site-specific poetry performance. Even kids can join in the fun as they put their sleuthing skills to the test with a Sherlock-inspired treasure

Dive into a world filled with violence. incest, bestiality and bloodshed with Darkness And Light - Tales From Southeast Asia. Poet and writer Yong Shu Hoong, 46, adapted three regional legends, including the tale of Bukit Merah, to be read aloud by storytellers, accompanied by music from a live gamelan orches-

"I know that it's for an adult audience, so I do keep in mind that it can be more mature. I don't have to play down the violence, I can play it up," says Yong. "In fact, the funny thing is that a lot of the violence is already in the story itself and it's only a matter of heightening certain aspects of it."

For example, about the tale of Bukit Merah, which explains the origins of the red soil on the hill, he says: "When the boy is killed in the story, I added a bit more detail, like how someone stabbed him in the stomach and twisted the knife If you read about it in a normal children's book, it might just say he was killed, without any graphic details."

If the darkness gets too suffocating, lighten up and stretch your legs with a literary walk with Irish-born writer Rosemary Lim, 53. She will be taking groups of participants on a literary walk from Singapore Management University to Raffles Place, passing locations such as Raffles Hotel, Chijmes and Cavenagh Bridge, as well as places which inspired novelists such as Joseph Conrad and Somerset Maugham. At each place, Lim will read relevant passages from texts she selected.

She says: "In a sense, because of the route, a lot of the books picked themselves !

Children can also don their detective hats with The Sherlock Sam Treasure Hunt, which is targeted at those aged six and above. Accompanied by an adult, children can run around the Civic District solving word and picture puzzles as well
