# He shows up for work against doctor's advice

F IT'S your 90th birthday, would you turn up for work?

L That's what former prime minister Lee Kuan Yew did yesterday.

And against doctor's advice no less, revealed Leader of the House Ng Eng Hen as he read a tribute to Mr Lee in Parliament yesterday.

His appearance drew a standing ovation from his fellow Members of Parliament.

"He forged the nation which today, is admired worldwide for its prosperity, harmony and stability.

"In lifting an entire nation, and improving countless lives of Singaporeans of several generations, Mr Lee Kuan Yew has left a lasting legacy for all of us, and achieved greatness," said the Minister for Defence.

But why did he make the special effort to appear in parliament yesterday?

## **Special place**

Parliament holds a special place in Mr Lee's heart, said Nominated Member of Parliament Eugene Tan.

"He has been a legislator first since 1955. Getting a strong mandate from the people was central to his political longevity. Parliament was where he was involved in the cut and thrust of debate and where he sought to explain policies and engage with his critics.

"I think he was also trying to show the MPs that Parliament has a special and important role in how Singapore is governed," said Assoc Prof Tan.

Birthday wishes and accolades had been pouring in from all over the world. At

90, Mr Lee is one of the oldest parliamentarians in the world.

Only 25 of the 90 sitting MPs and nonconstituency MPs were born when Mr Lee became Singapore's first prime minister in 1959.

That year, Law and Foreign Affairs Minister K. Shanmugam, Health Minister Gan Kim Yong, and Ms Denise Phua were born. The oldest then was Emeritus Senior Minister Goh Chok Tong, who was 18.

Ms Sylvia Lim, Mr Zainal Sapari, Dr Mohamad Maliki Osman and Mr Yee Jenn Jong were all born in the year that Singapore and Malaysia split in 1965, a historic event which saw Mr Lee Kuan Yew shed tears during the announcement.

Ms Tin Pei Ling, currently the youngest MP at age 30, said: "In all my life, I've known Mr Lee as the founding PM of Singapore. He and his team went through tumultuous times and tremendous struggle to create modern Singapore.

"He is a great man whom I deeply respect and he continues to inspire new generations of Singaporeans with his wisdom, strength and deep commitment for Singapore."

According to the MPs, it was a simple celebration at the member's room after they exited the chambers.

The birthday song was sang in three languages, English, Mandarin and Malay, and there was a cake in the shape of the number 90.

Mr Lee also made a short speech, where he highlighted the importance of a clean and honest government.

MP Seah Kian Peng said: "To reach the age of 90 is worth a celebration for anyone. "And Mr Lee is no ordinary person,
