Motivation for setting up ShareRight

"I've always had an interest in climate change and wanted to do something for the environment, and to create something that can benefit the community around me. When COVID struck, smaller businesses were hit hard. I knew there was little I could do to help these businesses increase revenue, but through the sharing economy, I could help them reduce their expenses. This motivated me to establish a startup that allowed businesses to optimise the use of their storage spaces or tap on those of other businesses (first in Singapore).

Why major in Sustainable Social Development?

Motivation for setting up Package Pals

Package Pals has housed 20 volunteers and hosted multiple event participants since it was set up in 2020. Founded on the principles of Reduce and Reuse, the first-of-its-kind startup seeks to give single-use packaging new life by collecting and distributing second-hand packaging to local businesses for reuse. Besides encouraging the reuse of typically single-use packaging, the startup helps to reduce the usage of brand-new packaging. Package Pals also raises awareness on topics related to waste management in Singapore and responsible consumption through public events, educational talks and facilitated workshops.

"My passion for sustainability and sense of responsibility to preserve the environment inspired me to set up Package Pals with a likeminded friend in May 2020, at the height of the circuit breaker."

Why an Individualised Second Major with the College of Integrative Studies (CIS)?

"It's become evident that passion for a cause needs to be accompanied by strong business acumen, in order to create long-lasting, impactful and scalable solutions. An interdisciplinary Individualised Second Major allows me to craft a holistic major that equips me with the knowledge and skills to be an influential advocate, as well as an effective organisational leader."

Why major in Urban Sustainability and Innovation?

"Sociology, law and communication modules appeal to my advocacy interests; they help gain a deeper understanding of interactions within (and between) businesses, governments and societies and government policies on green issues.

Motivation for setting up Future Lawyers (FL)

In 2019, at the age of 16, Lauren started a not-for-profit in Toronto with the goal of educating youth about the journey of a legal career. FLI has since grown its reach to more than 6 cities/countries worldwide, including Singapore, Toronto, Atlantic Canada and California.

"When I started the organisation, it was meant to only help students in Toronto. However, 3 years on, as opportunities arose, I managed to open chapters internationally in Singapore, the Canadian Atlantic and

California. Further, through this experience, and with my sister graduating with a PhD in Neuroscience, we are looking at the possibility of joining forces and starting a venture together sometime in the future. I am very grateful for all the encouragement and support that my family has provided me with and am excited for what is to come."

"As someone who has dabbled in a myriad of different disciplines and topics in my pre-university days (medical law, mock trials, business case competitions, engineering competitions), I find that an Individualised Second Major gives me the opportunity to integrate my interests while ensuring their relevance to the real world."

Why major in Innovation & Psychology?

"As a co-founder of an international youth organisation, Future Lawyers, my interest to be part of the startup ecosystem peaked.
